

I'm sat at my desk, when I could really do with packing for my post-Christmas leave, however I have endless emails to sort before I go and trying to write a Lenten reflection while I'm still in Christmas mode seems odd. I was struck today by today's Hymnody which tells us of forever singing Alleluia, and also in the message of Revelation as the voice like a great multitude cries out "Hallelujah!...God reigns...the marriage of the lamb has come...these are true words of God..." (19:6-10)

Which is interesting, because not long after we proclaim the 40-day old baby to be Our Salvation, do we turn to the cross. Moments after we hopefully open red envelopes full of joy and the dark ash sweeps our foreheads, do we no longer sing the A-word, for 'Eggs and Bacon' will be our song. This isn't because we are miserable, or we should use Lent to diet and feel sorry for ourselves, but we must look INTO OURSELVES and see where God is. I do feel I'm quite a Lenten priest and so I'm feeling ready for the season, but only because I'm an Easter one too!

This Lent I hope there will be some different opportunities to engage deeper into the great

mysteries of our faith – some extra worship, Lent Course (sorry as we print I have no further details yet of content), a Lent appeal, or some reading perhaps, and of course the incredible Holy Week when our lives will be changed forever - so do come and join in.

Today's Gospel of the Wedding at Cana, saw the first miracle as Jesus turned water into wine and began his ministry – we turn from the crib, and we may sing differently of our King, but we now seek a king, and our songs may be quiet, but they still proclaim forever the one God reigning from the Tree.

May you have a Holy Lent, (Don't get to Easter, without having 'lived' Lent!)

This year, Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent falls on 14th February. As I sit to share these few thoughts with you, I am reminded that it will soon be time for me to consider and reflect on a Lenten intention.

I well recall the Vicar coming into primary school one day for our RE lesson. He reminded us that it would soon be Lent and encouraged us to think about three things when making our special intention. Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving. He then handed out to each one of us a Lenten Purse and encouraged us to keep a good Lent by thinking of other people in need of hearing God's word.

He suggested that one way for us was to give up buying sweets during Lent and put the pennies we would have spent on them into the Lenten Purse! At Easter the money from the purses would then be sent abroad to help in missionary work. I'm not sure how many purses were handed back to him!!

Lent is a good time to build up virtuous habits. There are plenty of ideas for actions and practices. Coming up with ideas is not usually the problem, its sticking to whatever we choose to do that may prove difficult for our will power! However, whatever we choose to do we don't want to do anything simply to be doing it, even if it's a good thing; we need to do it to enable us to draw closer to God so that we're set for a grace-filled journey to Easter.
